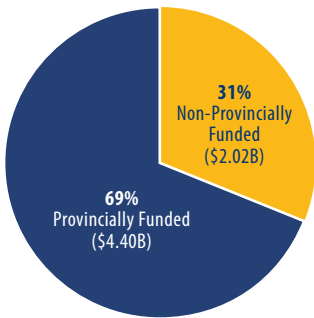


Social service sector agencies in British Columbia receive \$6.42 billion* of funding from all sources.

Ministry of Children and Family Development (MCFD) 2023/24

In 2023/24, MCFD:

- » Received protection reports on approximately **55,000** children and youth
- » Worked with **30,318** families through Children and Youth with Support Needs specialized services and funding programs (as at March 2024)
- » Served approximately **31,000** Child and Youth Mental Health clients over the 2023/2024 fiscal year
- » Working with an average of **971** youth through Community Youth Justice Supervision and Supports (2023/24)
- » Supported **86** adoptions

In 2023/24, CLBC:

- » CLBC currently serves **28,003** individuals
- » Persons served by eligibility category
 - ◇ Development Disabilities (DD) — **24,653 (88%)**
 - ◇ Personalized Supports Initiative (PSI) — **3,350 (12%)**
- » Program Budget Breakdown
 - ◇ Home Support Services — **62%**
 - ◇ Community Inclusion, Individual and Family Support, or Other Services — **38%**
- » In 2023/24 CLBC delivered services through over **8,700** contractual arrangements with **5,486** families and service providers

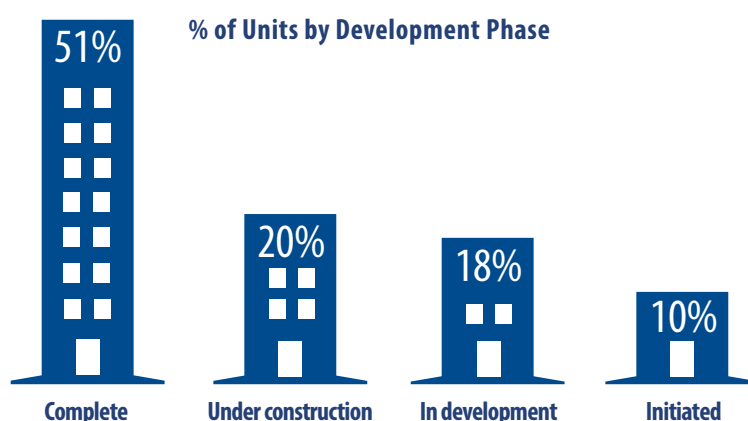

BC Housing

- » As of December 2024, there are a total of **46,353** units complete or underway funded through BC Housing
- » **29,170** units are funded through Building BC programs, **5,926** units are financed through HousingHub, and the remaining **11,257** units are funded through multiple other programs

Of the **46,353** units, **51%** are complete, **20%** are under construction, **10%** are in development and **18%** have been initiated.
